

## ZOOMOBILE PROGRAMS

Thanks so much for your interest in our integrative education programs! All Zoomobile programs are aligned to College and Career Readiness Standards, making them the perfect addition to your school year. The information below will help in selecting the right Zoomobile for your group.

- Duration:** 45 minutes, multiple sessions available in the same visit.
- Location:** Your school's auditorium, gymnasium, or other large room in a public indoor facility.
- Capacity:** 100+ people, including students and teachers.
- Date:** Any day! Please plan at least four weeks in advance.
- Cost:** Dependent on distance from the Zoo...
- Jackson and Clay Counties – free visit once per group per school year.
  - 0 – 30 miles – \$225 and \$100 for each additional same-visit session.
  - 31 – 60 miles – \$275 and \$100 for each additional same-visit session.
  - 61 – 90 miles – \$325 and \$100 for each additional same-visit session.

**The Food Chain Mystery:** This interactive presentation has students solve the mystery of “Who ate it?” by exploring the various roles that can make up a food chain. Objectives are for each student to be able to...

- Identify what a food chain is.
- Define the terms herbivore, carnivore, omnivore, and detritivore.
- Associate the above terms with an appropriate animal.
- Make a connection to the importance of each animal's role in a food chain to maintain balance in an ecosystem.

**The Magical World of Animals:** In this presentation, a magical journey full of fun facts explores the wild world of animals. Objectives are for each student to be able to...

- Define the word habitat.
- Make a connection to their personal lifestyle and how this can impact animals around the world.
- Identify various geographic locations.
- Understand how balance of animals, people, and plants is important no matter where you live.
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**Operation Perfect Pet:** Not all animals make good pets, especially ones found at the Zoo! In this presentation, Zoo Educators help your group to find the perfect pet. Objectives are for each student to be able to...

- Differentiate between wild and domestic animals.
- Make a connection with their personal lifestyle and their pets' needs.
- Create a sense of responsibility to choose pets wisely, and care for them.
- Understand how the pet trade has made a negative impact on some endangered species.
